

Here Were Settlers on Kingsmere Mountains

In the Sixties a Vigorous Colony, Had Farms High Up Beyond the Lake

Mr. James Padden Who Lived at Kingsmere at That Time Tells of the Coming and Going of a Dozen Irish Settlers Who Were a Hospitable, Jolly Lot, All with Big Families. Mountain Top Could Not Support Them.

It may, and probably will, surprise O.T.S. readers to know that in the fifties and sixties and up till about 40 years ago there was quite a colony of settlers right up on top of the Kingsmere mountain (not King's mountain), away back and above where Mr. J. A. Seybold and Mr. Levi Crannell live on the side road at

Anyone who has walked up the rough, stony and crooked road to the top of the mountain would wonder how the settlers. could get loads up to their homes. But they did.

The story about the Kingsmere mountain settlers is told by Mr. James Padden of Old Chelsea, who in his boyhood, in the fifties, lived at Kingsmere on the spot where the Larry Dunn family now live.

Mr. Padden, who has a really wonderful memory, is able to tell all about the people who lived on the mountain. He tells us that the mountain settlers were a most jovial and friendly lot and a hardy lot, but that unfortunately the mountain top was not able to nourish them sufficiently and one by one they quietly deserted their homes and went elsewhere; either that or the old people died and the younger generation than left

Every settler on the mountain was Irish, and most of them went on the land at the same time.

Names of Settlers on Mountain in Fifties

Record of a Settlement That Came and Went.

Those who lived on the mountain in the fifties and sixties, according to Mr. Padden, were:

Paddy Mullin, Jerry Sheehan, -Keoghan, Michael Eagan, Thos. Higgins, Hugh McGuire, Dennis Kennedy, Paddy McClusky, Michael Ryan, and Paddy Bradley.

All of the men except Ryan and Bradley were tillers of the soil. Michael Ryan and Bradley were tailors. They did not have shops on the mountain but followed the practice of tailors of the period of travelling the countryside with their tailor's kit and sewing from house

So much for the top of the mountain. Now for Kingsmere itself. What is called Kingsmere is that land which lies around King's lake (or mere), from Dunn's at the head of Dunn's hill to : Bryson's at the head of Lariault's hill and north and

south of King's Lake.
Mr. Padden is not sure as to who was the first to settle near or around the King's Lake, but he is able to tell those who lived in the vicinity in 1863 when he was a boy of 10 years.





THE RITCHIE SAWMILL Waterfront

In 1895, Robert and Thomas Ritchie, butchers and general store owners, purchased the old John Petrie sawmill started in 1860 and located on the present site of the Marina. By 1905, theirs was the largest mill in Aylmer, and one of the largest in the Valley. The Ritchie brothers began by cutting logs on the Gatineau Hills near Luskville, but shortly after 1900 purchased timber limits on the Petawawa River, employing more than two hundred men the year around. Their horses, used during the winter for the hauling of logs from the bush to the river, were pastured during the summer on the Ritchies' farm, situated where Glenwood Domaine is today. The mill closed down around 1920.



Bradley Ruin location






1940 map showing Bradley buildings And proposed outlook







Figure 25. Lots around Kingsmere. These lots show the properties of Mackenzie King's more immediate neighbours whose lands were slated for purchase.




Figure 24. Individual lot map. Lot maps such as this one were often prepared by government surveyors without the knowledge, or permission, of the proprietors.



FARMING

- Analysis of 1870 Census
- The land on the mountain was not as heavily treed as the terrain below the mountain. But the soil was, and is, often mainly leaf compost. This was fine for potatoes until the compost disappeared. The census for 1871 has the production of a few of the farms. Average productions are given.
- For crops. the average farm had 140 acres, with 40 acres improved, 12.5 acres of pasture, with a production of 4.5 bushels oats, 2 bushels peas, 2 acres for potatoes with a production average of 130 bushels, 5 bushels of turnips, 9 acres for hay with an average of 7 bundles or tons [the units are not clear to me], and 35 cords of firewood. A few of the farmers had a few bushels of apples and other fruit.
- For farm animals, the average number of horses above 3 years was 1.8, fillies and colts 1, milch cows 2.8, other horned animals 2.3, sheep 6, swine 2, cattle killed 1.6, sheep killed 1.6, swine killed 1.5, butter 220 pounds, wool 20 pounds and cloth 25 yards.

ACCESS

- The Ridge Road went from Kingsmere up a location near or at Booth Hill.
- The end of the road was held to be at the Riley Road which descended from a location near the intersection of trail 1 and trail 16.
- The Ottawa Ski Club considered the Ridge Road trail ending at McCloskey Road.
- From Kingsmere two roads are mentioned, the main road to Old Chelsea (and church for most settlers) and accessing the Mine Road to Hull, and the road to the current Mountain Road on Lauriault Hill, which road was very steep and is now closed and blocked by the Gatineau Parkway.
- There was a ski route from Kingsmere to Notch Road along the Hermit trail, but the Hermit trail does not seem to be mentioned is accounts of settler transportation.
- Beside the McCloskey Road leading to the Meech Lake Road, the Dunlop Road was used, and there is a old ski trail called Keogan's Road which roughly follows the Fortune Lake Parkway.
- Crilly Road to Mountain Road which the Old Champlain trail (1948) followed from Ridge to about the Parkway, and Crilly Road then descended towards Mountain Road in Hollow Glen; this is drawn on the map; this 'road' was also very steep.

CHURCH


St Stephen's Roman Catholic Church in Old Chelsea was the religious community for most of the settlers on Ridge Road, and accounts indicate that this community was taken seriously, with Sunday Mass reportedly attended faithfully. The journey was a long one, often by foot. The records of this parish are in excellent shape.

EDUCATION

- 1871
- Ridge Road at lot 24, range 9 (Keogan) likely on the access from Ridge Road to trails 17 and 11;
- near trail 50 (Fox Farm Road) at lot 26, range 13, near Lac Trudel.
- school at Meech Lake (near parking lot P11) around 1900.
- Eardley township had a school near the Healey farm on the Fire Road (trail 50) and at Young's Corners.
