

UPDATE ON THE SAMUEL BENEDICT PLAQUE

In October of 1972 the Historical Society of the Gatineau, in partnership with the National Capital Commission, installed and unveiled a bronze plaque to honour the memory of Samuel Benedict (1744-1820) and his wife Mary Dibble (1746-1825). The Benedicts were from Sharon, Vermont, arriving to settle in this area in 1801, a year later than the party led by Philemon Wright.

The unveiling took place at the corner of the Mountain Road and Gamelin Boulevard before a crowd of interested people with the late Arthur Davison, then President of the Historical Society, presiding over the ceremony.

The plaque, attached to a large stone bedded in the ground, was only yards away from the Benedict farmhouse on the Mountain Road, an ideal site.

Lately, the road engineers came up with a plan to rearrange the comer to meet increased traffic use. When the new road system was finally constructed, unhappily the bronze plaque was left in the middle of nowhere, where it could not be seen, except by the odd hiker.

As the National Capital Commission had been a partner of the Society in the placing of the plaque we approached the Commission with our dilemma. Our timing seemed appropriate, as the NCC's own planning service was engaged with plans for a new entrance to the Gatineau Park.

In June 1972 the Chairman of the NCC, Mrs. Pigott, assured us that the Commission had not forgotten about the plaque, and that it would be relocated in the near future.

Early in June of this year M. Jean-Luc Charron, the NCC's Land Management Planning Officer, invited me to accompany him to the present plaque site, as he had never seen it. This I was happy to do, as I had not seen it in four years. We stopped to see the Benedict farmhouse, only to discover it had been ruthlessly torn down. M. Charron was able to assure me that the plaque and stone will be moved to the entrance of the Park, where a parking lot will be installed.
